BACKGROUND: At the March 26, 2015 meeting, the Board awarded professional services agreements with Delta Airport Consultants, Talbert & Bright Inc., and Gresham Smith & Partners. The agreements were for one-year terms with four additional one-year options. The FAA required verification of the Authority's renewal of the first year's contract option with the two firms providing engineering services. Both of the existing Board Members were polled individually and both agreed and authorized the Executive Director to execute the "Option to Renew" to ensure the documents' timely submission to the FAA with the understanding that the item would be brought back to the Board for ratification.

In addition to the ratification of the engineering services renewal option, staff is seeking authorization for the Year #2 renewal term of the architectural agreement with Gresham Smith & Partners. The Executive Director is also seeking authorization to serve as the Authority's agent for administration of these contracts, including exercising renewal term options.

AUTHORIZING AGENTS FOR CERTAIN BANKING TRANSACTIONS

WHEREAS, the Charlottesville-Albemarle Airport Authority ("Authority") is a political subdivision of the Commonwealth of Virginia established by Acts of the Virginia General Assembly (ref. - (1) To open any deposit or share account(s) in the name of the Charlottesville-Albemarle Airport Authority ("Authority");
- (2) To endorse checks and orders for the payment of money or otherwise withdraw or transfer funds on deposit with United Bank;
- (3) On behalf of and in the name of the Authority, to borrow money on a short-term basis and to sign, execute and deliver promissory notes or other evidences of indebtedness;
- (4) To endorse, assign, transfer, mortgage or pledge bills receivable, warehouse receipts, bills of lading, stocks, bonds, or other tangible or intangible property now owned or hereafter owned or acquired by the Authority as security for sums borrowed, and to discount the same, unconditionally guarantee payment of all bills received, negotiated or discounted and to waive demand, presentment, protest, notice of protest and notice of non-payment; and
- (5) To enter into a written lease for the purpose of renting, maintaining, accessing and terminating a Safe Deposit Box in United Bank, Charlottesville Main, 1265 Seminole Trail, Charlottesville, Virginia.

LIMITATION ON POWERS: pursuant to §8 of the Charter of the Authority, the powers granted under paragraphs (3) and (4), above, within this Resolution are expressly limited to: (i) the borrowing of money that has been authorized in advance by resolution or ordinance of the Board, and (ii) to mortgages, pledges or subordination of interests in property of the Authority which have been authorized in advance by resolution or ordinance of the Board.

SUBJECT: Item #4 - Award Contract for the Install Triturator Project

RECOMMENDATION: The Board award a contract to Synchronized Construction Services in the amount of \$296,950 for the installation of a triturator and related work associated with the project.

BACKGROUND: Delta Airports Consultants completed the design of the project to install a triturator, and a request for bids was issued on February 29, 2016. The firms of Synchronized Construction Company and Digs, Inc. submitted bids as noted in Attachment #1. Delta Airport Consultants evaluated the bids as noted in Attachment #2 and have recommended the award of the contract to Synchronized Construction Services, the apparent lowest and most responsive bidder

Dear Mr. Pahuta:

We have completed our review of the bid proposals and have the following comments.

Synchronized Construction Services proposal was complete. No errors or irregularities were found.

Digs, Inc. proposal was also complete but contained the following errors and irregularities.

- No Virginia Contractor license number was provided on the Certificate of Non-Collusion.
 It was however provided on the Proposal form.
- The bid bond was incorrectly bound to Delta Airport Consultants, not the Charlottesville-Albemarle Airport Authority.

The Triturator is a specialty project. As such bid prices can be difficult to predict. Prices varied significantly from our estimate and each bidder. We believe the differences can be explained by unfamiliarity with the aircraft servicing process, the cost of the grinder pump station, the need to actively coordinate with both VDOT and the Albemarle County Service Authority, as well as the level of bidder interest.

Synchronized Construction Services is a reputable firm with previous experience at the airport. Most recently as a subcontractor on the Surface Parking Expansion Project.

We recommend initiating a dialog with the lowest responsive bidder, Synchronized Construction Services. It is possible project costs can be reduced through negotiation.

COST SAVINGS INCENTIVE PROGRAM GUIDELINES

Revenue

The REIP will allow employees to submit ideas to the Executive Director that will effectively reduce expenses or increase revenues towards our fiscal year operating budget. This program will be administered by the Executive Director, and all CHO employees are eligible with the exception of the Executive Director.

Each employee has a very important role at the Charlottesville Albemarle Airport. Employment comes with many responsibilities and without you, our experience to the customer (internally and externally) cannot be what it is. This program is designed to stimulate your thinking by focusing on your day-to-day responsibilities as it relates to expenses and revenues.

Here is how it works:

A CHO employee submits an idea to the Executive Director that is associated with decreasing operating expenses or increasing operating revenues. That idea or those ideas will be reviewed by the Executive Director for its validity and if the idea(s) are valid, then the Executive Director will issue a reward to the CHO employee. The idea(s) will only be valid if:

- Validated by the Executive Director
- Do not include eliminating jobs or reduction in hours worked
- Do not decrease safety, security, sanitary or customer service standards

The reward to the CHO employee will be based on the level of savings or increased revenue to the operating budget. The chart below outlines the (one-time) reward categories:

Expense Decrease or Revenue Increase

\$500 -\$1,000	\$50
\$1,001-\$1,500	\$100
\$1,501-\$5,000	\$150
\$5,001-\$10,000	\$500
\$10,001 – Greater	\$1,000

All rewards will be taxed as income.

The evaluation period must be determined by the Executive Director to ensure the validity of the expense decrease or revenue increase. The issuance of the reward is completely at the discretion of the Executive Director and subject to the availability of funds.

BACKGROUND: The 6 year ACIP was presented to the Board in March 2016 for preliminary review and to ensure that the listed projects would not pose any issues with related governing bodies. The FY17 Operating Budget was then distributed on May 11, 2016 for the Board's preliminary review.

PRESENTATION: CHO 101 – The Budget Process



I am pleased to submit for your review the proposed Operating & Capital Budget Plan for FY 2017. This plan is balanced within anticipated revenues and is designed to ensure that this facility and organization provides the highest level of service to its stakeholders at a reasonable level of fees and charges. It continues to preserve the airport's infrastructure as well as focus on customer service and enhancing the overall passenger experience.

Budget Highlights:

The FY 2017 budget will enable the Charlottesville-Albemarle Airport Authority to continue its mission to provide an economical, safe, and pleasing environment conducive to allowing all forms of air travel to thrive for the benefit of Charlottesville, Albemarle County and the surrounding nine-county region. Moreover it seeks to provide a rate structure to safeguard existing levels of service while continuing to seek new and enhanced service levels. It also ensures debt service coverage at the required rate and provides a portion of matching funds needed for federal and state grants.

Since 2008, CHO has seen a 47% growth in enplaned passengers from 177,494 in FY 2008 to 261,631 in FY 2015. Due to this constant growth pattern, CHO has experienced an increase in operating costs which has, in turn, resulted in higher airline fees.

CHO has always and continues to operate as lean as possible. For this reason, the Airline cost per enplaned passenger (CPE) has ranged from \$5.24 in FY 2008 down to \$4.20 in FY 2015. As outlined in the proposed budget, the CPE for FY 2017 is projected to be \$5.81. In researching airports of similar size, out of 24 airports (12 above CHO in enplanements and 12 below CHO), the CPE ranges from \$2.24-\$15.78. Only 6 of those have a CPE below \$5.81). Therefore, in relation to other airports of similar size, a CPE of \$5.81 is very reasonable although this will be an increase for the airlines from what they are used to when dealing with CHO, but it is necessary to keep CHO operating and successful.

The FY 2017 Capital Improvement Program totals \$9.4 million. Due to the timing and scheduling of the Runway 3-21 overlay project, the 1st phase of the project was scheduled in FY 2016 with the remaining phasing showing up in FY 2017 using \$3.2M which will be funded by the FAA and the Virginia Department of Aviation. The other big ticket items include; rehab of the parking lots, rehab of the north and south ingress/egress from the parking lots, covered walkways, an HVAC upgrade, a generator project, and a jet bridge refurbishment. The funding for most of these projects will be from state entitlements, Passenger Facility Charges and airport funds.

The majority of the Authority's revenue bond debt service will be paid in full by April 2019 with a small payment continuing through November 2020. The remaining debt at that time will be for the 2014 series issued for the surface parking lot which has semi-annual payments of \$91,658.39

until July 2025. There is a debt service related to the construction of the Rental Car Service Facility that is fully funded by the Customer Facility Charge (CFC), requiring no pledge or security from the Airport Authority. This debt will be retired in November 2020.

Across the Board changes:

Health Insurance – Health insurance premiums increased almost 12%. The increases noted are a larger percentage due to additional employees being added to various departments and the change in allocation of the premiums.

Overtime - Overtime costs in all departments increased due to the historical expenses reflected during weather related incidents.

Retirement - The mandated VRS employer contribution for FY 2017 decreased to 7.17% from the 9.06% in FY 2016.

Expense Increases By Department:

Terminal – Staffing, terminal maintenance, FIDS, paging system, terminal signage and disposal expenses all have increases mainly due to the increased passenger traffic and the upkeep of the increased terminal capacity post renovation. Aging systems need to be addressed to enhance the passenger's experience while in our terminal.

Airfield - Airfield equipment maintenance and access control maintenance and supplies both saw increases. CHO purchased a new piece of snow removal equipment in FY 2016 which needs specific replacement parts. Staff budgeted for additional cameras to enhance security as well as additional maintenance that may be needed on the system.

Parking - Grounds maintenance, signage and traffic control, and credit card processing fees have increased, again, mainly due to the increased passenger traffic that CHO has been experiencing.

Administrative – Staffing, IT expenses, professional services, advertising and promotion and air service development all saw increases in the proposed budget. CHO needs to keep up with improving technology. Needs are always arising in this area. As CHO moves forward with improvements and contract negotiations, it will be vital to obtain outside professional assistance to aid in such matters. Also a previously part-time marketing employee will be switched to full-time and the budget allows for two interns to be used as needed. Advertising and air service expenses have been increased to keep CHO visible to the public as their first air travel option and to keep the airlines informed of CHO's ongoing operations and improvements.

Conclusion

This budget represents a responsible and sound approach to meeting anticipated operational requirements for CHO during the current fiscal year. Staff is continuing to address the negotiation of a new airline use agreement. This will provide a foundation for continued airport development through a forthright and sound business relationship with the Authority's primary business partners. FY 2017 – Capital Improvement Program Narrative

The Airport Authority's FY 2017 Capital Plan is designed to provide modern, safe, and efficient amenities for the benefit of users and guests of the Charlottesville-Albemarle Airport (CHO). An investment of \$9.4 million in federal, state and Airport Authority resources is being programmed during this fiscal year period to accomplish these needed projects with approximately seventy-seven percent (77%) of this amount being derived from non-Airport Authority sources as follows:

Federal Aviation Administration:	\$ 2.9 million	31%
Virginia Department of Aviation:	2.0 million	21%

This plan identifies funds for the construction of the runway/taxiway overlay or rehabilitation project. The last overlay project was completed in 1996, and the pavement is beginning to show signs of deterioration such as oxidation and cracking. This is a priority for the Authority.

The construction phase of the 2014 Terminal Improvement Project is underway and will be completed during FY16.

Resources from the Airport Authority's Airline Coverage Fund Account will be directed toward accomplishing a myriad of projects that do not qualify for federal or state assistance. These projects generally include acquisition of Airport Authority vehicles and maintenance equipment, repairs to building systems, automobile parking equipment upgrades, and Airport Authority advertising equipment.

In continuing CHO's efforts to enhance customer service, the plan provides for covered sidewalks, a jet bridge refurbishment and a new generator for the terminal. The aging HVAC system will be upgraded and the older parking lots will be assessed for repairs.

Some projects will require tenant funding. A covered walk-way from the terminal to the Rental Car Return Lot will be funded from revenue in the Customer Facility Charge account. Another project to crack-fill and sealcoat the Rental Car Quick-Turn-Around (QTA) parking lot will be funded from the QTA Maintenance Funds.

FY 2017 CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM PROJECT DESCRIPTIONS

- A. Runway 3-21 and Taxiway Rehabilitation Construction Runway 3-21 and the Authority's taxiway system is in need of an overlay/resurfacing. The last overlay was completed in 1996 and the pavement is beginning to show signs of deterioration such as oxidation and cracking.
- B. Repayment of VDOA Land Acquisition Bridge Loans There were two land acquisition loans associated with the RW 3-21 Ext project that remained open due to unresolved issues with landowners. It was decided to close these loans. The funds were received from VDOA with the understanding that they would be repaid later by FAA funds. The state has agreed to allow CHO to use state entitlement funds to repay 80% of the balance. The Authority funds will pay the rest. Staff will continue to pursue payment from the FAA in regards to these loans as that was the original intent.
- C. <u>LT/ST/Economy Parking Rehab Design & Construction This project will</u> allow for the rehabilitation and improvement of the Authority's three existing public parking lots.
- D. Rehab North and South Ingress/Egress from parking-Construction—This project will reconstruct the northernmost and southernmost steps. It will take out one set of steps at the south end and it will modify one set of steps at the elevator to accommodate a ramp system.
- E. <u>Covered Walkways/Ticket Spitter Covers</u> This project will provide for the design and construction of a covered walkway system from the terminal northward to the Economy Parking Lot and south from the Rental Car Return Lot to the new Employee Parking Lot. Approximately one-fourth of the cost of this project will provide for covers for the ticket spitters at the Authority's public parking lots. The covers for the ticket spitters are not eligible for VDOA funding so this portion of the project will be funded from Coverage.
- F. <u>Heating and Cooling Upgrade</u> The project will upgrade the aging HVAC system that has been in place since the terminal was constructed in 1996. The system often needs repair and maintenance costs have increased over the last several years.

- G. <u>Generator Phase 2</u> Currently, when the terminal loses power, there are sections of the terminal that are without emergency power. This project will allow for the entire terminal to be functional in case of a power outage.
- H. Rental Car Covered Walkways This project will provide for the design and construction of covered walkways from the terminal building southward to the Rental Car Return Parking Lot.
- I. <u>Jet Bridge Refurbishment</u> The jet bridge is approximately 20-years old and needs repairs. The project will refurbish the jet bridge and allow for heating and cooling as well.
- J. <u>AAAE IET (Badging/SIDA program)</u> CHO utilizes a computer-based testing system to ensure that all recipients of badges are familiar with the security regulations associated with working on and around a Part 139 commercial airport. The current badging testing system needs to be updated to ensure that all badge recipients are kept current with any new federal requirements and all existing airport regulations for airside operations.
- K. <u>Energy Modification Windows</u> Windows throughout the terminal need to be upgraded for energy efficiency.
- L. <u>Security System Upgrade Phase 2</u> The security system received an upgrade in FY 2016. Other areas have been identified as needing added security. This project will address those areas.
- M. <u>Crackseal, Sealcoat, Marking TW/Ramp</u> For routine maintenance allowed on the ramp and/or apron as needed.
- N. Old Firehouse Rehab The old firehouse is currently used for storage of airport equipment. The building needs a heating and cooling upgrade as well as some internal reconfigurations to make better use of the space.
- O. <u>Internal Radio Replacement</u> This line item allows room for any 800 Mhz radio replacements should the need arise.
- P. Replace Parking Vehicle The vehicle is used to assist passengers in the parking lot and the existing vehicle needs to be replaced due to its age and condition.
- Q. <u>All Terrain ARFF/EMS Unit</u> This unit will allow for rescue efforts in challenging locations that cannot be reached by our current fleet.

- R. <u>Skid Steer Loader</u> This piece of equipment will be used for airfield maintenance.
- S. Replace Admin Vehicle (Impala) Replace aging fleet
- T. <u>State Entitlement Debt Service (VDA Portion)</u> This item is the utilization of state entitlement funds for debt service associated with public use space in the air carrier terminal facility. Use of entitlement funds in this fashion is proposed throughout the remainder of the Authority's debt service life.
- U. <u>QTA Lot Sealcoat/Crack-fill/Restriping</u> The pavement in the Rental Car QTA lot is in need of repair.
- V. <u>Loader</u> This is to replace an aged piece of equipment.
- W. <u>Gutter Replacement for Old Terminal (Firehouse)</u>- To replace aging gutters.
- X. South End Hangars (Heat) The airport recently purchased the remaining leasehold on two box hangars on the south end. The airport will use both of these for airfield equipment storage, and this project will allow for these areas to be heated.
- Y. <u>Art Program Cases</u> This project will allow for the purchase of art cases to be used on the post-security section of the terminal
- Z. <u>Bush Hog To replace an aged piece of equipment.</u>

1. Executive Director's Update

- a. Airline Update Staff is continuing to work with our airline representatives to negotiate a new Airline Agreement.
- b. Parking Feasibility Update/Rentalx Car Agreement Update Staff is working with two consultants to update the Airport's parking garage feasibility study. It is anticipated that their report will be presented at the July meeting. The Authority's rental car agreements will expire on June 20, 2016 at which time they will go into hold-over status. Due to the possibility of constructing a parking garage in the near future that will contain a section that will be allocated to the rental car "ready and return" lot, the RFP for rental car services will not be pursued until the funding portion of any future garage is determined.
- c. Custodial Contract Update The Authority's custodial contractor, Ragsdale, has agreed to mutually terminate its contract. A combination of Authority and seasonal employees (including former Ragsdale employees who have already complied with all FAA and TSA security/badging requirements) are being used to ensure that the Airport remains clean and presentable to our users while staff proceeds with the issuance of a RFP for "custodial services". Concurrently with the RFP process, staff will also be evaluating the costs and benefits of taking this function in-house. Both the response of that RFP process and staff's evaluation of the possibility of bringing custodial services in-house will be presented to the Board for consideration.

 - a. Runway/Taxiway Rehab Project Design 100% design plans have been submitted to the FAA for review.
 - b. Terminal Improvement Project- Discussion of plumbing upgrades in the baggage claim area to be provided

 - d. Parking Ingress/Egress project Discussion of the phasing of the project will be provided.
